

1 GENERAL INFORMATION

1.1 SYSTEM DESCRIPTION

The AGM Rattler TS19-256 and Rattler TS25-256 are the compact thermal imaging scopes developed for 24 hours operation under any weather and environmental conditions. The Rattler series scopes use a high-sensitivity 256×192 thermal detector and 1024×768 OLED monitor, which provides a clear image under harsh environment conditions like darkness, fog, smoke, dust, rain, snow, wood, camouflage, etc.

Powered with two CR123 batteries the AGM Rattler provides up to 4.5 hours of continuous operation. An external 5V power bank (battery pack) can be easily connected via a USB-C connector for a significant increase of operating time. Onboard Wi-Fi module is also available for live video streaming and video/images recording via mobile application.




FIGURE 1-1. MAIN PARTS AND COMPONENTS




FIGURE 1-2. OPTIONAL EQUIPMENT

2 OPERATING INSTRUCTIONS

2.1. BASIC OPERATIONS

2.1.1 UNPACKING

The following steps must be completed prior to each mission.

1. Open the carrying case, remove the device, and verify that all components are included.
2. Inspect the device for any obvious evidence of damage to the optical surfaces, body, eyecup, operation buttons, etc. Ensure that all optical surfaces are clean and ready for use. Clean all optical surfaces with a lens tissue.

2.1.2 BATTERIES INSTALLATION

CAUTION:

Verify that the equipment is OFF before remove the batteries.




FIGURE 2-1. BATTERY INSTALLATION

To install the batteries (refer to Figure 2-1):

1. Turn the battery cover knob (A) counter clockwise and then open the battery cover (B).
2. Install two CR123A or RCR123A batteries (C) into the battery compartment. Align the polarity symbols on the batteries as shown below.
3. Close the battery cover. Turn the battery cover knob clockwise until stop.

When the device is on a battery charge level is displayed on the status bar.

2.1.3 BATTERY VOLTAGE SELECTION

The device supports 3.0V or 3.7V RCR123 rechargeable Lithium batteries or 3.0V RC123A non-rechargeable batteries. After installing the batteries, select

the correct battery voltage in the device menu according to the actual voltage of the battery being used (Paragraph 2.2.2). The factory default of battery voltage is 3.7V. Use this setting for RCR123 batteries. If using CR123A, change the setting to 3.0V.

2.1.4 CONTROL BUTTONS




FIGURE 2-2. CONTROL BUTTONS

The Rattler controls are shown in Figure 2-2 and are defined in Table 2-1.

Each button is responsible for some functions selected by short press or long press of the button. Pushing a button for 3+ second is considered “long press/hold.”

2.1.5 POWER ON AND OFF

Power On

With the battery installed, press and hold the POWER button  to turn on the device.

NOTE

See the battery icon on the device display for the electricity quantity. Icon  means the battery is fully charged, and icon  means that the battery is low. When the low power note shows, replace the batteries.

Power Off

When the device is turned on, hold the POWER button  to turn off the device.

Auto Power Off

In the “Auto Power Off” menu you can set the time for the automatic shutdown of the device as required (OFF / 30 min / 45 min).

The Auto Power Off function starts countdown when Standby mode enable. The auto power off countdown is disabled when the device wakes up from standby. The countdown will be restarted when the device is put into standby mode again.

2.1.6 STANDBY MODE

Standby mode is used to save battery power. In this mode, some power-consuming features such as the display, network hardware, or internal storage will be temporarily disabled.

In the view mode, press the POWER button . After a few seconds, the display will turn off. Press the POWER button  again to exit the Standby mode.

2.1.7 THERMAL VIEW OBSERVATION

1. Power on the device.
2. Bring the scope to your eye and make sure the eyecup covers your eye.
3. Look into the eyepiece and turn the diopter adjustment ring until the reticle and On-Screen Display (OSD) details are sharply focused.
4. Point the scope towards the object of the view. Bring the object into focus by rotate the objective focus ring.

NOTE:

You must perform the focus adjustment before any further use of the scope.

5. Set palette, brightness, contrast, scene mode and FFC (Flat Field Correction), to display the best image effect.

2.1.8 ON-SCREEN DISPLAY

On-screen interface displays the main setup menu items and device status indicators.

Hold the MENU button  in the view mode to display or hide the menu.




FIGURE 2-3. ON-SCREEN DISPLAY

Press the MENU button  in the view mode to display or hide the OSD information.

When OSD is on, the information of Wi-Fi hotspot activation, magnification, storage memory status, battery status, time and date displays on the screen.

2.1.9 PALETTE SETTINGS

You can select different palettes to display the same scene in different effects. Press the MODE button  in the view mode to switch palettes.

2.1.10 DIGITAL ZOOM

Press the ZOOM button  in the view mode to switch between 1x, 2x, 4x and 8x digital zoom. The image magnification value is displayed on the screen:

- Rattler TS19-256: 2.5x, 5x, 10x, 20x
- Rattler TS25-256: 3.5x, 7x, 14x, 28x

2.1.11 DISPLAY OF THE RETICLE

Hold the ZOOM button  in the view mode, to display or hide the reticle. The crosshair helps you to aim at the target fast and accurately.

2.1.12 PICTURE IN PICTURE

In the live view you can quickly enable or disable the Picture-inPicture (PIP) function by holding the MODE button .

The PIP window at the top of the screen displays the details of central part of the image at 2x zoom.

2.1.13 SHUTTER RELEASE

Press the SHUTTER button  in the view mode to release the shutter once for correction of the non-uniformity of display.

2.1.14 VIDEO RECORDING AND IMAGE CAPTURE

Video Recording

Hold the CAPTURE button  in the view mode and start recording. In the upper left corner, the recording time displays.

Hold the CAPTURE button  again to stop recording.

Image Capture

Press the CAPTURE button  in the view mode, to capture the image.

NOTE:

- When captured, the image freezes for 1 second and a prompt shows on the display.
- For exporting captured images, refer to File Export.

2.1.15 CONNECTING THE DEVICE

WARNING:

Please remove the batteries from the battery compartment before connecting the device to your PC, or it may cause computer damage.

1. Open the cable interface cover.
2. Connect the device and power adapter with a Type-C cable to power on the device. Alternatively, connect the device and PC to copy/delete files.




FIGURE 2-4. CABLE INTERFACE

2.1.16 FILE EXPORT

WARNING:

Please remove the batteries from the battery compartment before connecting the device to your PC, or it may cause computer damage.

1. Before connecting the thermal rifle scope to a computer, please make sure that the Wi-Fi function of the rifle scope is disabled.
2. Connect the thermal rifle scope to your PC with USB cable and open the detected disk.
3. The directory is named by the current date. Enter DCIM > "Date" to view the videos and snapshots.
 - Select and copy the videos to PC and play the file with the player.
 - Select and copy the snapshots to PC and view the files.
4. Disconnect the device from your PC.

NOTE:

- The device displays images when you connect it to PC. But functions such as recording, capturing and hot spot are disabled.
- When you connect the device to PC for the first time, it installs the driver automatically.

2.1.17 INSTALLING THE RATTLER ON A PICATINNY/WEAVER RAIL

WARNING:

Always make sure your firearm is unloaded before you place the scope on the firearm. Reconfirm that the chamber is empty if you stop the procedure then resume later. Safe firearms handling rules should be followed at all times.

The Rattler comes with a Picatinny/Weaver mount. The mount is secured to the scope with two screws. The recommended tightening torque for the fixing screws is 4-5.3 Nm (5.44-7.2 ft lb).

NOTE:

Mount model depends on the region of sale. Different models of mounts may have different designs.

To install the Rattler on a Picatinny/Weaver rail, perform the following:

1. Unlock the clamping device of the scope mount by pushing down on the lever holder (A) and unlocking the lever (B).
2. Install the scope on the Picatinny/ Weaver rail so that the stop (C) slides into the transverse slot on the rail.
3. Affix the scope to the rail by locking the lever (B).
4. Verify that the clamping device is firmly holding the Rattler. If necessary, adjust the clamping device's lever-cam lock as detailed in part 2.1.18.




FIGURE 2-5. MOUNT

2.1.18 CLAMPING DEVICE ADJUSTMENT

To adjust the mount's clamping device, do the following:

1. Remove the Rattler from the weapon.
2. With the clamping device unlocked (as shown in Figure 2-5), push the cam (E) towards the arrow, which will cause the nut (D) to slide out of its hole.
3. To tighten/ loosen the clamping device, push down on the cam (E) and turn the nut (D) CW/ CCW respectively, in one-two increments (see note below). Much like when the cam (E) is released, backward-moving spring will cause the nut (D) to slide back into its hole.

NOTE:

The eight-sided nut of the mount lever-cam lock will only fit into their hole if turned in one of the discrete positions, using increments equal to $360^\circ/8$.

4. Verify that the adjusted lever-cam lock securely holds the weapon mounting rail.

2.2 MAIN FUNCTIONS

2.2.1 MENU OPERATION

When the device powers on, hold the MENU button  in the view mode to display the menu.

Press  or  buttons to move between menu items. The active element is highlighted in orange. Press the MENU button  to select menu item or change an option.

Hold the MENU button  to save settings and exit the menu.

2.2.2 BATTERY VOLTAGE

The device supports 3.0 V or 3.7 V rechargeable Lithium batteries or 3.0 V non-rechargeable batteries. Select the correct battery voltage in the device menu after you install the batteries, or it may cause abnormal shutdown.

1. In the view mode, hold the MENU button  to show the menu.
2. Press  or  button to select  **Battery Voltage** menu item, and press the MENU button  to switch the voltage.
3. Press  or  button to select another battery voltage (3.0 V or 3.7 V), or **Cancel** to exit without saving the settings.

2.2.3 NETWORK CONFIGURATION

Connect your phone to the Wi-Fi hotspot of the rifle scope, you can configure the parameters and realize functions of the device.

1. Hold the MENU button  to show the menu.
2. Select  **Network** menu item and press the MENU button  to enable or disable Wi-Fi hotspot.
3. Press  or  button to move to another menu item or hold the MENU button  to exit a menu.

Open the AGM Connect APP and connect your phone with the device (refer to Section 2.3). You can view the interface of rifle scope on your phone.

NOTE:

When the power is less than 15%, the Wi-Fi hotspot function will be turned off automatically.

2.2.4 CONTRAST ADJUSTMENT

1. Hold the MENU button  to show the menu.
2. Select  **Contrast** menu item and press the MENU button  to adjust the image contrast. You can select one of ten levels of the contrast.
3. Press  or  button to move to another menu item or hold the MENU button  to exit a menu.

2.2.5 BRIGHTNESS ADJUSTMENT

1. Hold the MENU button  to show the menu.
2. Select  **Brightness** menu item and press the MENU button  to adjust the brightness. You can select one of ten levels of the brightness to adjust the image lighter or darker.
3. Press  or  button to move to another menu item or hold the MENU button  to exit a menu.

2.2.6 SCENE MODE

You can select proper Scene Mode according to environment temperature to improve the display effect.

1. Hold the MENU button  to show the menu.
2. Select  /  **Scene Mode** menu item ( is default option) and press the MENU button  to switch scene.

Recognition mode () improves an image so that the object edge is more distinct.

Jungle mode () is more suitable for hunting environment because of the highlight function of small objects.

3. Press or button to move to another menu item or hold the MENU button to exit a menu.

2.2.7 PICTURE IN PICTURE MODE

1. Hold the MENU button to show the menu.
2. Select PIP menu item and press the MENU button to enable or disable Picture In Picture mode. The PIP window show in the upper part of screen.

NOTE:

- When Reticule is enabled, the PIP view is the detail of crosshair. When Reticule is not enabled, the PIP view is the detail of central part.
- If digital zoom is enabled, the PIP view also zooms. If the digital zoom ratio exceeds 4, the PIP does not zoom.

3. Press or button to move to another menu item or hold the MENU button to exit a menu.

In the live view you can quickly enable or disable the Picture-inPicture (PIP) function by holding the MODE button .

2.2.8 ZEROING PROFILES

The user can customize and save five profiles with different reticle settings. In each profile, you can configure up to five types of reticle, firing distances and reticle corrections.

1. Hold the MENU button to show the menu.
2. Select Zeroing Profiles menu item.
3. Press the MENU button to switch the zeroing profile.
4. Press or button to move to another menu item or hold the MENU button to exit a menu.

The right top of the image displays the reticle information. For example, A1-50m means you are using the Zeroing No. 1 in the Profile A, and the set range is 50 m.

NOTE:

There are 5 zeroing profiles in total, and you can configure 5 reticles, zeroing distances and corrections in each reticle group.

2.2.9 RETICLE

You can select a reticle in the current zeroing profile, and set parameters such as type, color, and boresight correction (coordinates) for the reticle.

Select the Zeroing Profile first.

1. Hold the MENU button (⊞) to show the menu.
2. Select  Reticle menu item and press the MENU button (⊞) to enter the reticle setting interface. Press (+) or (-) buttons to move between options.
3. Select a Zeroing No. You can select OFF to disable the reticle.

4. Set reticle type.

- 1) In the reticle setting interface select **Type**.
- 2) Press the MENU button (⊞) to select a reticle type. 5 types of reticle can be selected.

NOTE:

The scale intervals of the Reticle 4 changes synchronously under the current digital zoom. The value of one scale interval of the Reticle 4 is 4 mil (6.75 MOA).

5. Set reticle color.

- 1) In the reticle setting interface select **Color**.
- 2) Press the MENU button (⊞) to select a reticle color. Black, white, red and green colors are available.

6. (Optional) Repeat 3 to 5 to set type and color for other reticles in this profile.

7. Hold the MENU button (⊞) to save and exit.

2.2.10 BORESIGHTING

Correcting the reticle can help you aim at the target with high accuracy. The rifle scope has the ability to boresighting using the “One-Shot Zeroing” method.

Set the target to the selected zeroing distance. Select a zeroing profile in the menu of the scope. Align the reticle with the center of the target and shoot. If the point of impact does not coincide with the aiming point, correct the reticle.

1. Hold the MENU button  to show the menu.
2. Select  Reticle menu item and press the MENU button  to enter the reticle setting interface.
3. Select a **Zeroing** number you want to correct.
4. Set the distance to the target:
 - 1) In the reticle setting interface select **Distance**.
 - 2) Press the MENU button  to select the digit you want to change (color of selected digit will change to the orange).
 - 3) Press  or  buttons to change the number.
5. (Optional) Select **Freeze** option, and press the MENU button  to enable the Freeze function.

NOTE:

When enabling the Freeze function in reticle, you can adjust the position of the cursor on a frozen image. This function can prevent image flutter.

6. Two crosshairs show in the view. The big one is reticle crosshair, and the small one is reference small crosshair. Reference crosshair will appear in the centre of the display. Zero the scope by moving the reticle on the screen. Set the reticle position:
 - 1) Aim the big reticle at the center of target.
 - 2) (Optional) Select **Zoom** option, and press the MENU button  to switch the zoom ratio.
 - 3) Select the coordinates **X=0.00 Y=0.00**.
 - 4) Press  and , buttons to move reticle left and right (X coordinate), press  and  buttons to move reticle up and down (Y coordinate).
Holding the reference small crosshair at the aiming point (center of the target), move the reticle until it is aligned with the point of impact. The coordinates show the current position of the reticle.

- (Optional) Repeat 3 to 6 to set the position for other reticles in this profile. You can save up to five corrections in each profile.
- Hold the MENU button (☰) to exit. The window “Save the parameters?” will appear.
 - OK: Save the settings and exit.
 - CANCEL: Exit without saving the settings.

2.2.11 IMAGE CALIBRATION

The Image calibration function in the Rattler performs the so-called Flat Field Correction (FFC) can correct non-uniformity of display. During correction, a shutter will be lowered in front of the detector. A click is heard and the image is momentarily interrupted. In this case, the detector is calibrated and the image becomes more accurate.

- Hold the MENU button (☰) to show the menu.
- Select (⊕) **Image Calib.** menu item and press (☰) button to switch the FFC mode.

Auto FFC: The rifle scope performs FFC automatically when switching on or rebooting the camera.

Manual FFC: Press (⊙) button in live view to correct the non-uniformity of display.

External: Cover the lens cap, then press (⊙) button in live view to correct the non-uniformity of display.

- Press (⊕) or (⊖) button to move to another menu item or hold the MENU button (☰) to exit a menu.

2.2.12 CVBS OUTPUT

You can view the video on CVBS monitor, to get a better and clear image, more convenient to check the detail.

- Connect the USB-CVBS cable to USB port of thermal rifle scope and to monitor’s CVBS port.

NOTE:

USB-CVBS cable need to be purchase separately.

NOTE:

CVBS Output function doesn’t support hot plug, so please connect the cable before powering on.

2. Hold the MENU button  to show the menu.
3. Select **CVBS** menu item and press the MENU button  to turn on or turn off the CVBS video output.
4. Press  or  button to move to another menu item or hold the MENU button  to exit a menu.

2.2.13 DEFECTIVE PIXELS CORRECTION

Defective Pixels Correction (DPC) function can correct the defective pixels on the screen which have not performed as expected.

Before you start switch the palette to White Hot mode.

1. Hold the MENU button  to show the menu.
2. Select  **DPC** menu item and press  button.
3. Press , ,  and  buttons to move the cursor to the dead pixel.
4. Press the MENU button  to correct the dead pixel.

2.2.14 AUTO POWER OFF

You can set the time for the automatic shutdown of the device as required.

1. Hold the MENU button  to show the menu.
2. Select  **Auto Power Off** menu item and press  button to select OFF, 30 min or 45 min.
3. Press  or  button to move to another menu item or hold the MENU button  to exit a menu.

2.2.15 UNIT

You can set the unit (yards or meters) of measurement for distance.

1. Hold the MENU button  to show the menu.
2. Select  **Unit** item and press the MENU button  to switch the unit.
3. Press  or  button to move to another menu item or hold the MENU button  to exit a menu.

2.2.16 BURN PREVENTION

You can protect the thermal scope under the sun or other bright light with high temperature that could leave a damage to the rifle scope. When you point the device directly at the heat, the shutter will be released and cover the sensor to protect it. It resumes once the environment turns to normal.

1. Hold the MENU button  to show the menu.
2. Select  **Burn Prevention** menu item and press  button to turn on or turn off the Burn Prevention function.
3. Press  or  button to move to another menu item or hold the MENU button  to exit a menu.

2.2.17 VERSION

1. Hold the MENU button  to show the menu.
2. Select  **Version** menu item and press  button. You can view the device information such as firmware version and serial number.

3. Press  or  button to move to another menu item or press the MENU button  to exit a menu.

2.2.15 RESTORE DEVICE

You can reset the settings of device.

1. Hold the MENU button  to show the menu.
2. Select  **Restore** menu item and press  button. The window "Initialize?" will appear.
 - **OK**: Restore the device to defaults.
 - **CANCEL**: Exit without changing the settings.

2.2.17 LANGUAGE SETTING

You can select different languages of user interface.

1. Hold the MENU button  to show the menu.
2. Select  **Language** menu item and press  button to select the language.
3. Press  or  button to move to another menu item or hold the MENU button  to exit a menu.

2.2.18 TIME SYNCHRONIZATION

You can display the date and time on the screen. 24-hour and 12-hour time format are available.

1. Hold the MENU button  to show the menu.
2. Select  **Time Sinc.** menu and press the MENU button  to enter the Time Synchronization interface.
3. Press  or  buttons to select the **24-Hour Time** and press the MENU button  to switch the time format.
4. Press  or  buttons to select the **Time** or **Date** and press the MENU button  to select the hour, minute, second, year, month, or day to be synchronized. Press  or  buttons to change the number.
5. Hold the MENU button  to save settings and exit.

2.2.19 ON-SCREEN DISPLAY (OSD)

You can choose which OSD information to display in the live view interface. You can see Wi-Fi hotspot activation, current magnification, storage memory status, battery status, time and date in top of viewfinder.

1. Hold the MENU button  to show the menu.
2. Select  **OSD** menu item and press the MENU button  to enter.
3. Press  or  buttons to select the **OSD**, **Time** or **Date**. Press the MENU button  to switch on/off.
4. Hold the MENU button  to save settings and exit.

Press the MENU button  in the view mode to display or hide the OSD information.

2.2.20 DISTANCE MEASUREMENT

The device can measure the distance between the target and the observer's position.

NOTE:

When measuring the distance, keep your hand and the position steady. Otherwise, the accuracy may be affected.

1. Hold the MENU button (≡) to show the menu.
2. Select **Measure** menu item and press the MENU button (≡) to enter the distance measurement mode.
3. Press (+) button to enter the target setting interface.
 - 1) Press (•) or (+) to select the target from Wolf, Bear, Deer, and Custom.
 - 2) Press the MENU button (≡) to set the target height. Press (+) or (•) buttons to change the number. Each target height preset can be modified from 0.1 to 9.9 m. Press the MENU button (≡) to confirm.
 - 3) Hold the MENU button (≡) to save settings and exit target setting.
4. Align the center of the top mark with the top edge of the target. Press the MENU button (≡). The top mark blinks and then changes to the bottom mark.
5. Align the center of the bottom mark with the bottom edge of the target. Press the MENU button (≡). The bottom mark blinks and then disappears.
6. The left top of the image displays the distance measurement result and the height of the target.

NOTE:

Go to distance measurement interface, and press (≡) button to view the result of the previous measuring target.

2.2.21 HOT TRACKING

The device can detect the highest temperature spot in the scene and mark it on display.

1. Hold the MENU button (≡) to show the menu.
2. Select **Hot Tracking** menu item and press the MENU button (≡) to enable/disable hot spot mark (marking the spot of highest temperature).
3. Press (+) or (•) button to move to another menu item or press the MENU button (≡) to exit a menu.

When the hot spot mark is enabled, the green cross mark -|- displays in the spot of the highest temperature. When the scene changes, the green mark moves.

2.3 CLIENT SOFTWARE INTRODUCTION

Search the AGM Connect software in App Store (iOS System) or Google Play™ (Android System) and install the application on your mobile phone. Turn on the Wi-Fi hotspot on the thermal device and then connect your phone to the hotspot.

- Hotspot Name: Wlan-<Serial No.>

- Hotspot Password: Last 9 digits of Serial Number of your digital scope.

NOTE:

The device password is set by user at first activation. If the password was lost or forgotten, it can be reset. To reset a password perform the following steps:

1. When the rifle scope is turned on, hold the MENU button (⊞) to activate the OSD menu.

2. Select [⊞] menu item and press the MENU button (⊞) to restore all parameters to default settings.

1. Run the app and connect the phone or tablet with the device.

2. If the device is inactivated, set the password and activate it. If the device is activated, enter the password to add it to the app.

3. When the device is added, the live view can be seen. You can view the interface of the device on the software. User can change such image parameters as brightness, contrast, zoom, palettes directly via phone or tablet as well as record video on phone/tablet memory.




FIGURE 2-12. CLIENT SOFTWARE

3 MAINTENANCE

3.1 MAINTENANCE

3.1.1 CLEANING PROCEDURES

1. Gently brush off any dirt from the body of the device using a clean, soft cloth.
2. Moisten the cloth with fresh water and gently wipe down the external surfaces (except lenses).
3. Dry any wet surfaces (except lenses) using another dry, clean, soft cloth.
4. Using a lens brush, carefully remove all loose dirt from the lenses.
5. Use a high quality lens wipe to remove dirt or smudges from the lens and display window. Do not use abrasives or solvents to clean the housing, lens, or display window. Clean the glass surfaces using circular movements, starting from the center of the lens and moving out towards the edge.
6. Clean the accessories with a soft brush (or cloth) dampened with soap and water.

3.1.2 PREPARING FOR EXTENDED STORAGE

CAUTION:

Thoroughly dry each item before placing them into the storage case.

To prepare the rifle scope for extended storage:

1. Clean the rifle scope and accessories.
2. Place all items into the storage case.

3.1.3 UPGRADE DEVICE

WARNING:

Please remove the batteries from the battery compartment before connecting the device to your PC, or it may cause computer damage.

If you removed the batteries, please make sure the device is connected to the computer during the update process. Otherwise, the device will shut off and may cause unnecessary upgrade failure, firmware damage, etc.

1. Visit www.agmglobalvision.com/firmware website. Select your product, download the firmware update package to your PC and unzip it. Follow the detailed instructions on the website.
2. Connect the device to your PC with USB cable.
3. Turn on the device. Make sure the Wi-Fi hotspot function is disabled.
4. Open the detected disk (USB drive) in file manager program. Copy the unzipped `digicap.dav` file and paste it to the root directory of the device.

5. Turn off the device completely, then power it back on. After awhile, the firmware update process will start automatically. During the update, the screen will display the inscription “Upgrading...”. The update process will be completed when the inscription “Upgrading...” goes out.

6. Turn off the device and disconnect it from your PC.

You can also enjoy automatic update function in AGM Connect App (see section 2.3 for details).

1. Start the AGM Connect App and tap the Settings icon in the left top corner.

2. Tap your device in the device list. The information about your device will be shown.

3. Tap **Checking for Upgrade** to detect and download the latest FW version.

3.2 TROUBLESHOOTING

Table 3-1 lists the most common malfunctions that may occur with your equipment. This table does not list all the malfunctions that may occur with your device. If the equipment malfunction is not corrected by the suggested actions, or a problem occurs that is not listed in this table, please contact AGM Global Vision’s Customer Support center or your retailer.
